Hampton swinging way into record

Peter Gabriel may not have had Centerburg resident Dave Hampton in mind when he recorded Sledgehammer, but you can bet that 51-year-old Hampton hums the tune sometimes when he works out. In fact, Hampton is so devoted to his Sledgehammer that he is going to use it in an attempt to get in the Guinness Book of World Records.

From 10 a.m. until 1 p.m. on Saturday, August 15, Hampton is going to attempt to set a world record by swinging a long-handled, 12 pound sledgehammer 2,304 times in three hours.

"I've been weight training for 37 years, I started in 1971," Hampton explained. "I've been swinging a sledgehammer for cardio and core strength for years - I can do it for hours on end. I got the idea to petition the Guinness Book of World Records for a special category where I plan to swing a sledgehammer for three consecutive hours, at least 2,000 swings, 64 swings every five minutes.

Hampton said the Guinness Book of World *Records* folks turned him down the first time he petitioned, but he was persistent and succeeded when he peti-

"Part of what we decided to do was ask people to drop a canned good or two off at Vineyard for their food pantry as part of the Guinness Book of World Records Sledgehammer attempt," Hampton said.

So that he's not hitting a completely stationary object that would break the sledgehammer handle, Hampton hits a tire embedded in the ground.

"It takes me two minutes and 40 seconds to do 64 swings, so that gives me time out of every five minutes to catch my breath," Hampton said. "The most I've done it has been for 1 1/2 hours, but I don't think three hours will tax me at all. But who knows, we're going to find out.

"My wife thinks I'm a little crazy," he added, "but she says she sticks around to see what I'm going to do next."

Hampton said anyone is Centerburg, between 10 a.m. and 1 p.m. on August 15.

'You just might see a piece of Guinness Book of World Records history being made," he said. "And on your way here, drop a few canned goods off at Vineyard Church

in Sunbury."

Trenton couple compete at **Sprint Nationals**

On July 26, Condit area residents James Aust and Tracy DiSabato-Aust competed in the 2009 Pacific Coast Triathlon (PCT) in Newport Beach, California.

This year's PCT also served as the 2009 USA Triathlon Sprint National Championship, with the top 10 athletes per age group qualifying for Team USA and the opportunity to compete at the ITU Sprint World Championship in Australia in September.

James and Tracy race in the 50 to 54 age group. In an email last week, DiSabato-Aust said because of unusually rough Pacific Ocean conditions the open water swim was cancelled and the meet became a run-bike-run duathlon.

We had a blast, it's a gorgeous part of the world," DiSabato-Aust wrote. "Jim did great. There were over 80 men in his age group and he came in seventh. I came in second in my age group - Sprint National Champion 50-54 Runner-up."

DiSabato-Aust said there were 40-plus women in her age group. She completed the course 1:02:57, only 52 seconds behind Sprint National Champion 50-54 Elizabeth Bulman of San Diego.

"It was a huge race that brought out lots of fellow All-Americans and some fun competition," DiSabato-Aust said. "We also raced the Sunday before Sprint Nationals at the Nationwide Better Health/Columbus International Triathlon. We did great in the Olympic distance race. Jim won his age group and I was the overall female winner ... podium again.'

James Aust is a dentist with a Columbus practice; Tracy DiSabato-Aust is a horticulturalist and designer who has written three gardening books and lectures internationally. Both James and Tracy are TeamUSA athletes.
